Gates have been erected barring access to public roads and easements, and in fact privatized and armed security now patrols said areas having frequent and potentially dire interactions with the public. Another recent news worthy event occurred near the Sawtooth National Recreation area in just the past two weeks. Two brothers who had traded and bought land which was previously public land, and who knew full well when they purchased the property that a trail easement with the USFS would be maintained through their property, harassed and threatened USFS trail personnel with a helicopter hovering over them for reportedly more than an hour in an attempt to stop or slow trail building and maintenance. These landowners are now lobbying for and trying to get the taxpayers and counties to build a new trail outside their property and to close the trail access to the public. The Idaho Wildlife Federation (IWF) is Idaho's oldest statewide conservation organization, founded by sportsmen and women in 1936. Today, we represent a nonpartisan voice of 28 affiliate organizations with 45,000 affiliate members and individual supporters who desire to sustain and enhance Idaho's fish and wildlife, conserve their habitat, and maximize sporting opportunity for current and future generations.</p> <p>IWF and our McCall-area members have serious concerns with many components of the proposal and the potential impacts to both the City of McCall and Valley County. We believe there are simply too many unknowns of a proposal this size for the public to support at this time. Privatizing this landscape will alter how McCall residents and visitors experience McCall and the surrounding area forever in a fundamental way. While we recognize the Council does not have direct authority over the final decision made on the future of these lands, we would still like the Council to hear our hesitations.</p> <p>IWF fully understands that management of endowment lands differ from Federally managed public lands. Access to these lands for the public is not always guaranteed and IDL is not required to provide access. That said, the majority of the endowment land parcels around McCall are currently accessible for recreation. Despite conversations with Trident, IWF is not convinced that this proposal will provide for a net-gain of public access for recreation in the McCall area and may actually contribute to a net-loss of access state-wide. IWF has not received concrete examples from Trident of which areas around McCall would be set-aside for public access, open-space, conservation, or recreational values.</p>

			<p>Additionally, IWF has not been able to receive information on specific areas where inevitable development would occur on the current endowment parcels, how much development would occur, and what assurances the public will be provided to ensure that the landscape is developed responsibly with wildlife and open-space in mind. Private timberlands and timber companies in North Idaho used as an example for a potential swap to the State are currently under Access Yes! Agreements and other access agreements with Idaho Department of Fish & Game (IDFG) to provide sportsman and women access on large swaths of private lands. When asked about seeking parcels of private timberlands that are not currently under Access Yes! Agreements with IDFG, Trident could not provide a direct answer. While Trident’s vision for open-space and a trail network for the public in large sections of the identified landscape is commendable, there is a lack of information provided on the funding structure to ensure that these areas, trails, and roads will be adequately maintained. Additionally, we are unsure that Trident is fully understanding the additional burdens that this privatization and increased development may put on the City of McCall and Valley County with fire prevention and response with the expansion in the Wildland-Urban Interface. These ongoing maintenance and prevention costs have not been answered in our conversations with Trident. Trident’s notion is that the only way to ensure public access to this landscape, allow IDL to fulfill the constitutional mandate, and preserve open space in-and around McCall, is to privatize them through this proposal. It is bad financially because the swap is a lopsided trade. According to news sources, the Northern Idaho land is worth \$85,000,000 and has 2.9 million board feet of timber. Based on an estimated cost per acre of \$60,000 per acre in the McCall area, \$85,000,000 is equal to selling 1417 individual one acre lots or 5% of the land proposed for the swap near McCall. The State Land near McCall is twenty times more valuable than the timber land in Northern Idaho. If it was the only option, selling as little as 10 acres of public lands around McCall could generate more income for the state in one year than the total potential timber sales generated from the land in Northern Idaho. For example, the asking price for an acre of land near McCall ranges from \$60,000 to \$75,000. Selling 10, one acre lots could generate between \$600,000 to \$750,000. In comparison, selling the 2.9 million board feet of timber present on the Northern Idaho land at an average of \$175.00 per 1000 board feet, would produce only \$507,500. Once the timber is cut, it will take at least 70 to 100 years before it is profitable to re-harvest. With raising land values, the money generated by sales of small units of property could increase exponentially. By making small sales over time and continuing to generate funds from other land use lease agreements, the state will have a sustained source of extra funds for our schools. The amount generated by the sale of small portions of land over time makes the money generated by timber sales seem like small potatoes. The land swap is bad politically. Privatizing large tracks of public land will incite a strong public reaction. The loss of the land around McCall has the potential to</p>

			<p>reduce or eliminate public access to both the land sold and to adjacent Forest Service land. Public opposition to a large land swap of the lands around McCall will be substantial and could result in considerable political backlash for those officials involved. Trident Holdings may promise to maintain access to the land, but there is no way to assure Trident Holdings will keep that promise once they own the land. As an investment company, Trident Holdings will sell the land to others, and most likely to less altruistic land owners. Privatizing the state endowment land around McCall would take away access to significantly more land than just the lands privatized. With the steady population growth in Idaho, it is more important than ever to maintain access to public land. The access to public land is one of the biggest benefits of living in Idaho. Many Idahoans move here and stay here because of the free access to open spaces that Idaho offers. Public opposition to small portions of land sold would be minimal and generally accepted. If selling the endowment land was the only option, the land could be sold in a way to maintain public access and keep the major portion of the land public. It does not make sense to make a huge lopsided land swap that would result in a long term financial loss for the state and have the potential to close off our lands and arouse the public. It makes good sense for the State of Idaho to make small sales over time, if necessary, and maintain land use leases to generate a sustainable high profit and financial gain for our schools while maintaining free public access to our lands. My question is, will the McCall City Council support what is best for the New York Investors of Trident Holdings, or support what is best for the people and public schools of Idaho? Regarding the proposal by Trident Holdings Idaho, Company to do a land exchange with the State of Idaho in the area surrounding McCall, it is not clear to me what role the City of McCall can play in this proposal. Never the less, I would like to make some comments and propose some questions for your consideration.

The lands proposed for this project are key to the enjoyment of this beautiful part of Idaho. The State of Idaho is legally bound to collect revenues from these lands in order to fund state institutions and support education. At the same time, tourism is one of the driving forces of the economy of Idaho. Developing lands in the forests of Valley County and surrounding Payette Lake threatens the attraction of the area and thus threatens the tourism economy of Valley County.

Trident Company proposes to trade land in northern Idaho that is ripe for timber harvest to the State in exchange for the land within Valley County. The timber would be harvested to create revenue for the state, but once the timber is harvested, that land then becomes unattractive and unavailable for other uses, and thus for other sources of revenue for the following 100 years, or so. Is this the best revenue-generating use we could make of state-owned lands?

If logging timberland in northern Idaho were the best moneymaking deal for the state, wouldn't it be the best moneymaking deal for Trident Company? Why doesn't Trident choose to make a profit by logging that land in northern Idaho themselves? I believe they see more potential for profit in exploiting the land the state owns in Valley County. Can the State of Idaho find a way to make money off the land they already own here?

What bonding can the city impose on Trident Company to defray costs of infrastructure development to the city?

Does Trident own land in northern Idaho that could be traded to the state, or are they depending on selling land that the state owns to finance a purchase of land to be traded to the state in exchange for the land they sell while the state owns it?

At tonight's meeting, we ask that you do not show support for Alec William's plans, and do not give him any sort of blessing. However, we hope that you will ask a lot of questions.

First, some historical context is necessary.

Please consider the history and beneficiaries of Idaho endowment lands. There is discussion around the use and value of, and control in, this land. These concepts of property, control, and value are second nature to us. It can be easy to forget that only 160 years ago, a few decades prior to the state being "granted" this land, that the Northern Shoshone Tribes (including the Paiute and Bannock), along with the Nez Perce, regularly inhabited and utilized lands encompassed in Trident's proposal for hunting, fishing, gathering, and other cultural purposes. See "Hear Me My Chiefs, Nez Perce Legend and History," L.V. McWhorter, pg 24-28. In 1855 the Nez Perce ceded approximately 7 million acres of their aboriginal area by treaty with the United States, land that extends south of Payette Lake. In 1863, by subsequent treaty, the Nez Perce ceded approximately 7.5 million acres which diminished their reservation to 750,000 acres. Under the Dawes Act in 1887 this diminishment continued, which reduced the Nez Perce Tribes holding to 250,000 acres in north-central Idaho. Concurrently land south of the Nez Perce territory was seized by the United States from the Sho-Pai, Sho-Ban, and other Shoshone bands, around 1863. See <https://www.landgrabu.org/lands> for a general overview. These cessations and seizures are what allowed the United States to grant Idaho land as it entered statehood.

Please note that we feel strongly that Native American Tribes speak for themselves. At the same time it is important to acknowledge this history when discussing these issues. Articulation of ownership and use, particularly in a historical context, ought to be done in a way that acknowledges these facts.

Trident's proposal can be considered a product of the system that perpetuates the diminishment of Native American land and rights. We think it's time for us to take a step back and perhaps consider a different land ethic than what Alec Williams proposes. He says he wants to "preserve this land" and pitches the idea that preservation cannot happen without development; he makes the assumption that development in sensitive areas is inevitable. However, we need to reevaluate these assumptions. There is such a thing called ecological limits. We are questioning how "clustered developments" atop cliffs and hills and nestled away in the forest are possible considering the vast amount of city resources that would be needed, from EMS services to road maintenance, to the management of wastewater. Further development in the area surrounding Payette Lake will unnecessarily burden the Payette Lakes Recreational Water and Sewer District (PLRWSD) and we question whether PLRWSD will be able to continue its mission to "protect the health and welfare of local citizens."

There are many solutions for increasing revenues and reducing costs. For example, the state could generate revenues for the endowment fund by charging recreation user fees on these lands, similar to fees paid into the invasive species fund. The state could work with conservation organizations to put these lands under a conservation easement and those monies paid for the conservation easement would go into the endowment fund. There are so many more solutions. It's time to bring all the stakeholders and citizens together for a real conversation.

We suggest that the council issue an invitation to the State Land Board, the Valley County Commissioners and all citizens to engage in a conversation exploring other options for how to ensure that these endowment lands provide the greatest public benefit for all: clean water, healthy habitat for animals, and wild spaces for Idahoans to roam.

Finally, a few questions:

- Why didn't Alec Williams
- approach the regional office first?
- What exactly does he want
- to do with the 28,000 acres? Does he have an acre by acre plan?

July 9, 2020 Dear City Council Members, As regards the proposed Trident Holdings land exchange, I understand the endowment lands in question are a means of returning revenue to schools. As a beneficiary of forest funds while an MDSD student from 1990-2003 and as a teacher in the district, I understand these funds are invaluable. Nevertheless, I'd like to draw attention to the Idaho Department of Lands' website, wherein it articulates its mission, vision, and commitment: "To professionally and prudently manage Idaho's endowment assets to maximize long-term financial returns to public schools and other trust beneficiaries and to provide professional assistance to the citizens of Idaho to use, protect and sustain their natural resources" (emphases mine). The second clause highlights IDL's commitment to protecting and sustaining natural resources, and I believe this applies not only to private holdings, but also to public lands, for being used and enjoyed by the public, they, in effect, become "their natural resources." Indeed, IDL's vision is to: "be the premier organization for trust management and resource protection in the western United States," and alongside representatives from the USDA, Forest Service, and the State of Idaho, IDL's director signed a pact on 12 December 2018 to collaborate in stewardship with the aforementioned agencies to "reduce fuels and wildfire risk to communities, create and sustain jobs, and improve forest health and resiliency." In short, I oppose the Trident Holdings land exchange, for, were it to occur, it could inhibit appropriate forest management efforts. Thank you for the opportunity to comment on the presentation from Trident Holdings LLC (Trident) on the proposal to the Idaho State Land Board about a potential swap of private timberland for Idaho Department of Lands Endowment Lands in McCall. The Idaho Wildlife Federation (IWF) is Idaho's oldest statewide conservation organization, founded by sportsmen and women in 1936. Today, we represent a nonpartisan voice of 28 affiliate organizations with 45,000 affiliate members and individual supporters who desire to sustain and enhance Idaho's fish and wildlife, conserve their habitat, and maximize sporting opportunity for current and future generations. Our efforts advance "made in Idaho" solutions to the modern challenges of wildlife management.

IWF and our McCall-area members have serious concerns with many components of the proposal and the potential impacts to both the City of McCall and Valley County. We believe there are simply too many unknowns of a proposal this size for the public to support at this time. Privatizing this landscape will alter how McCall residents and visitors experience McCall and the surrounding area forever in a fundamental way. While we recognize the Council does not have direct authority over the final decision made on the future of these lands, we would still like the Council to hear our hesitations.

IWF fully understands that management of endowment lands differ from Federally managed public lands. Management of these lands is entrusted to the State Board of Land Commissioners (Land Board), while Idaho Department of Lands (IDL) carries out the directives from the Land Board as well as the constitutional mandate to maximize long-term financial return to the State. Access to these lands for the public is not always guaranteed and IDL is not required to provide access. That said, the majority of the endowment land parcels around McCall *are* currently accessible for recreation. Despite conversations with Trident, IWF is not convinced that this

proposal will provide for a net-gain of public access for recreation in the McCall area and may actually contribute to a net-loss of access state-wide. IWF has not received concrete examples from Trident of which areas around McCall would be set-aside for public access, open-space, conservation, or recreational values. Additionally, IWF has not been able to receive information on specific areas where inevitable development would occur on the current endowment parcels, how much development would occur, and what assurances the public will be provided to ensure that the landscape is developed responsibly with wildlife and open-space in mind.

It is also important to consider the recent contract signed between the Idaho Department of Fish and Game (IDFG) and the Idaho Department of Lands. IDFG now pays IDL - with funds accrued from hunting and fishing license sales - in exchange for access to IDL lands for the public. This contract was specifically designed to allow IDL to turn down land sale and exclusive-access lease proposals while fulfilling their constitutional obligation by weighing the loss of perpetual IDFG funding against a one-time sale of IDL lands. Even without this contract, many have questioned Trident's claim that this parcel is not fulfilling its constitutional mandate.

Though outside of McCall, the potential swap of endowment lands involves an exchange for private timberlands, likely in North Idaho. Many of the private timberlands and timber companies in North Idaho used as an example for a potential swap to the State are currently under Access Yes! Agreements and other access agreements with Idaho Department of Fish & Game (IDFG) to provide sportsman and women access on large swaths of private lands. When asked about seeking parcels of private timberlands that are not currently under Access Yes! Agreements with IDFG, Trident could not provide a direct answer.

While Trident's vision for open-space and a trail network for the public in large sections of the identified landscape is commendable, there is a lack of information provided on the funding structure to ensure that these areas, trails, and roads will be adequately maintained. Additionally, we are unsure that Trident is fully understanding the additional burdens that this privatization and increased development may put on the City of McCall and Valley County with fire prevention and response with the expansion in the Wildland-Urban Interface. These ongoing maintenance and prevention costs have not been answered in our conversations with Trident.

Trident's notion is that the *only* way to ensure public access to this landscape, allow IDL to fulfill the constitutional mandate, and preserve open space in-and around McCall, is to privatize them through this proposal. We don't believe this to be the case. IWF fully supports a locally-driven process to aid the Land Board's decision on the future of endowment lands around McCall. We encourage the City Council, the Chamber of Commerce, and the Valley County Commission to remain engaged in the process and reach out to all interested parties when concerns arise. Thank you for your dedication to serving the City of McCall and for the opportunity to write to the Council.
